

NOTES ON THE CONTRIBUTORS

Stephen D. Behrendt received a master's degree in European history from the University of Wisconsin-Madison, where he is currently finishing his Ph.D. dissertation on the British slave trade, 1785-1807. He presented a paper entitled 'Slave-ship crews and the health care of slaves' at the 1991 Canadian Association of African Studies conference in Toronto.

Phyllis Giles followed her London Hons B.A. with an Oxford Diploma in Education before spending some eleven years as a history teacher. Her M.A. was completed as a mature student at the University of Manchester. After twenty years as H.M. Inspector of Schools she resumed research into the Stockport area and retains this interest, although now living in Warwickshire.

Adrian Jarvis is Curator of Port History at Merseyside Maritime Museum, and has produced a number of publications on the subject. He is a tutor on the Liverpool University M.Sc. course in the history of science and technology. His current research interest is the economic, social, and political consequences of nineteenth-century Irish immigration into England and Wales. His book, *Sectarian violence: the Liverpool experience 1819-1914*, appeared in 1988.
