

NOTES ON THE CONTRIBUTORS

Clyde Binfield read History at Emmanuel College, Cambridge. Since 1964 he has taught in the Department of History at the University of Sheffield, where he became a Reader in 1984. He has developed a particular interest in the architecture of Protestant Nonconformity.

A. Basil Cottle taught at the University of Bristol from 1946 to 1990 and retired as Reader in Mediaeval English. Between 1943 and 1945 he worked at Bletchley Park as one of the ENIGMA team, breaking German codes.

Martin J. Crossley Evans is an Assistant Secretary of the University of Bristol and Warden of two of the Halls of Residence. His particular interest is in the field of eighteenth-century ecclesiastical history.

David Dutton is Senior Lecturer in History at the University of Liverpool. He is the author of *John Simon: a Political Biography* and *His Majesty's Loyal Opposition: the Unionist Party in Opposition 1905-15*. He is currently preparing a study of the career of Sir Anthony Eden.

P. J. W. Higson is an alumnus of Liverpool University and lectured until 1990 at Chester College of Higher Education. He was recently co-author of a book on anti-Semitic abuses in Nazi-occupied France and of a new edition of Baudelaire's poetry translated into English verse.

Martin Lynn is Lecturer in Modern History at the Queen's University of Belfast. He has published articles on West African economic history, on business history, and on the economic history of Bristol. He is currently completing a book on British trade with West Africa in the nineteenth century.

Peter King studied chemistry at Leicester University and then qualified as a solicitor. An interest in local history led him into research on the iron industry in the period before the industrial revolution.

Edward Morris studied history at Cambridge University and then art history at the Courtauld Institute. He has been a curator at the Walker Art Gallery, Liverpool, since 1966. His publications include catalogues of that collection and of the Lady Lever Art Gallery collection.

Maurice Whitehead was educated at St Francis Xavier's College, Liverpool, and at the universities of Durham, Cambridge, and Hull. He was a secondary school teacher in London for eleven years before taking up his present appointment as a Lecturer in Education at the University of Hull in 1987. He is the author of numerous articles on the history of education in the north-west of England.
