

## ST. PAUL'S CHURCH, LIVERPOOL.

OUR last volume contained an account of the destruction of St. Peter's Church, then the oldest building in Liverpool, with a view of it taken after it was closed for use. Another "Corporation Church," that of St. Paul in St. Paul's Square by the Exchange Station, is now being demolished, and the view of it here given is from a photograph taken in 1916 by our fellow-member Mr. J. A. Waite at the request of the late Mr. J. Paul Rylands. The church was built under an Act of Parliament obtained in 1762; the erection occupied from 1763 to 1769. There is an early view in Enfield's *Liverpoole*. Welsh services were held in 1793, for the district then contained a large number of Welsh residents. The changes brought about by time deprived the church of any congregation, and after remaining practically derelict for years it was closed in 1900 as unsafe.
