Mr Peter Bolton is a history lecturer at the North East Wales Institute of Higher Education, where he teaches a range of subjects from the Renaissance to modern European history. His research interests include British social and economic development and he is shortly to embark upon a PhD study to examine this development in the context of north-east Wales.

Tony Dyson, BA, BLitt, FSA, retired Historical Research Officer at the Museum of London Archaeological Service, was responsible for the historical documentation of excavation sites in the City of London, 1974-98. Much of this work, including that on the evolving topography of the City's medieval waterfront, is published by the Museum in related journals. He is currently exploring some of the obscurer aspects of Wirral history.

Dorian Gerhold, FRHistS, read history at Merton College, Oxford, and is currently a Clerk of the House of Commons. He has written and published extensively on early road transport and has also worked on various archival and metropolitan topics. He is chairman of the Wandsworth Historical Society, a former chairman of the Transport History Research Trust and is on the editorial board of the *Journal of Transport History*.

A retired teacher, Dr Malcolm Gratton has written and lectured extensively over the past 35 years. His main research interest is the seventeenth century and his book on 'The Parliamentarian and royalist war effort in Lancashire, 1644-1651' is shortly to be published by the Chetham Society.

Mr Michael D. Handley MA is a retired senior teacher who taught history for 31 years in grammar and comprehensive schools in Lancashire and the Midlands. Before his teaching career, he wrote a Masters thesis based on three nineteenth-century Cheshire Poor

Law authorities. He is currently writing an article about poverty in the Wirral.

Mr Jonathan Healey is completing a doctorate on poor relief in early modern Lancashire at the University of Oxford. He is currently the Tawney Fellow of the Economic History Society, and a lecturer in history at Magdalen College, Oxford. His interests include the history of poverty, dearth and famine, the economics of gender, the family and the household, landscape history and popular politics.

Mr A. J. Martinez, Jnr, is a student at the New York University School of Law. He holds an A.B. in history from Princeton University and an M.Phil in medieval history from the University of Cambridge.
